#### Uniform and Belongings:

   Jewellery of any other kind is to be left at home.
- Ensure that your child's change of clothing has been replaced once used.
- All belongings including bags and toys are to be left at home.

#### Routines and Rules

At Pre-School, the children have been trying hard to...

- use gentle hands.
- take turns and share.
- join in chats.
- listen to others.
- help at tidy up time.
- do their best in their work and
- engage in friendly behaviours...

As with all things, it takes time and plenty of practice to learn new skills.

Learning about emotions, self-regulation and rules are no different to learning how to walk, ride a bike or eat with a spoon....it takes practice, praise, and consistency in approach.

At Pre-School we highlight and reward positive behaviours saying what was good e.a.

"Well done for sharing the cars,"

"That was kind you helped your friend to pick up the Duplo,"

"Great job getting a timer to help wait for your turn,"

# "Lovely gentle hands playing with the trucks."

During the year, we will continue to explore routines, rules, and emotions through various strategies.



One of the ways we do this is through story.

To begin to develop a greater understanding of what our Pre-School 'Golden Rules' mean we use the Jenny Mosley books.

These stories expand on each rule through relatable incidents we can explore so we can promote learning every day in a 'fun and safe way.'



# Pre-School Golden Rules

- 1. We are gentle.
- We are kind and helpful.
- 3. We listen.
- 4. We are honest (tell the truth).
- 5. We work hard (try our best).
- 6. We look after property (our own and school belongings)

At home you could have a go at exploring how our 'Golden Rules' can relate to family life.

A lovely little story we use at Pre-School to explore various emotions is 'The Colour Monster.'

### Getting Ready to Learn (GRTL)

We are fortunate to be taking part in the DE funded "Getting Ready to Learn' project again this year. There will be useful information headed your way to help support your child's learning and development during their Pre-School year.

The aim of the GRTL project is to raise standards for all Pre-School children. Our focus is on the 'Big Bedtime Read' with the key GRTL messages:

- A reduction of screen time
- The promotion of consistent and positive bedtime routines and
- The promotion of reading for fun, closeness, relaxation and to promote a calm readiness for sleep.

We will be in touch to let you know more about our home lending library, when it will commence and how it will operate - hopefully this will begin by November.

I have attached some Nursery Rhymes from GRTL for you to try at home in supporting your child's early language development. Nursery Rhymes are also great for promoting an ear for rhythm and rhyme in addition to being a lot of fun! There are lots of tips and information on the GRTL Nursery Rhyme leaflet too.
